# Individual vs Group Type of Lessons

Individual Lessons

### **Description:**

One-on-one lessons where the student works closely with the teacher for the full 45 minutes. This format allows for fully customized teaching, adapting to the student's pace, goals, and learning style.

#### **Pros:**

- ▼ 100% teacher attention
- Personalized lesson plans
- Flexible pacing and material
- ✓ Ideal for students with specific goals or learning needs

#### Cons:

- Higher cost
- No peer interaction
- Less exposure to ensemble playing

## **# Buddy Lessons**

## **Description:**

A hybrid format of total 45 minutes, combining 25 minutes of individual instruction and 20 minutes of duo time with another student of similar age and level. It offers both personal focus and the benefits of peer learning.

#### **Pros:**

- Balanced mix of solo and peer time
- Encourages social learning and musical collaboration
- Great value for the price
- Builds confidence in a low-pressure peer setting

#### Cons:

- Less total solo time than full individual lessons
- Requires careful pairing with another student
- Peer dynamics may vary



## **Description:**

Two students of similar age and pianistic level share the full 45-minute lesson. Activities may include playing duets, learning theory together, and developing listening and ensemble skills.

#### **Pros:**

- ✓ Most affordable
- Builds teamwork and listening skills
- Encourages peer motivation
- Great for developing rhythm and coordination in group settings

#### Cons:

- Less individual instruction time
- Needs a well-matched partner in terms of level and focus
- Seemingly slower progress, but more benefitial in the long run
